2020 GUILD ANNUAL SHOWCASE (Project of the Year)

General Notes:

Two items can be submitted per member per category. Items cannot be entered in multiple categories. The item must have been completed by the entrant within 12 months of the entry date. Items must be submitted and prepared for Judging between 10:00 and 10:30am on the day.

CATEGORIES, PRIZES and TROPHIES

WEAVING - LYN WARING TROPHY

Most votes receive a certificate, voucher and trophy.

SPINNING - CECILE DORWARD TROPHY

A skein, made from hand spun fibre, with attached sample and description of fibre and intended use. Most votes receive a certificate, voucher and trophy.

DYEING:

Natural or chemical dyes permitted. The entry may be a skein or item of commercial or hand spun fibre. Most votes receive a certificate and voucher.

FELTING - BARBARA FREW TROPHY

Most votes receive a certificate, voucher and trophy.

KNITTING/CROCHET:

Any handstitched item made from Hand spun yarn, spun by the entrant. Most votes receive a certificate and voucher.

NOVICE/JUNIOR - JOSEPH DENNIS TROPHY

Any item as per above categories, made by a first-time entrant or member under 18 years of age. Most votes for Novice entry receive a certificate, voucher and Trophy

GROUP or COLLABORATIVE ENTRY - TURNER COTTAGE TROPHY

A group entry is to be a single item or cohesive set of items showcasing any mixture of the Guild's core crafts of weaving, spinning, dyeing or felting, where a group is defined as three or more individuals (who do not need to be an official Guild group). Items may also be partly crocheted or knitted. Note- items entered as a group entry CANNOT be also entered individually. Most votes receives certificate, voucher and trophy (donated by Frank and Isobel McKay).

Matilda Bay Spinning Day 2020






It was a really beautiful day down at Matilda Bay on Saturday 18th January. A small but dedicated group of Guild members enjoyed the perfect weather and stunning location.

Born South Carolina USA in August 1927, died Perth November 2019, aged 92

Peggy and her (now deceased) husband Michael moved to Perth from the USA in 1965

Peggy joined the Guild and shared her Spinning and later weaving knowledge with many others. In 1970 she organised the first workshops for the guild.

A tribute to Peggy Buckingham

Peggy and I met and learnt to spin in the early sixties, we joined the Guild in 1965 -66 and with Maxine Veitch we often took spinning, weaving and dyeing workshops to Guild Country Groups.

The Perth Guild supported these ventures as a means of connecting with isolated country groups, we enjoyed the hospitality of country people as we shared our knowledge.

Ultimately the ARTS ACCESS Programme took over this role.

Peggy qualified in the USA as a Chemist and her meticulous notes and samples of all her work on the chemical dyeing of wool for the tapestries woven by the Guild Tapestry Group.

Peggy's dyes and research from fungi collected by Katie Symes for her book on Fungi are evidence of this.

Peggy was a member of the Spinning team who went to Dannevirke in the North Island of New Zealand to contest the Fleece to Garment Challenge in 1973. The team of 5 spinners and knitters from the Guild each took large George Wright spinning wheels to the event and really appreciated the generosity of the New Zealanders, for each team was allocated a space (designed for small Ashford wheels) we did not fit into our space, but the crowd held onto the ropes surrounding our space and pulled them outwards. We did not win but sold all the wheels.

Peggy was a tireless worker for the Guild and a strong supporter of the Craft Association, and her interest and support remained throughout her life.

She will be remembered for her generosity, positive thinking, and contribution to the history of the Guild.

Our sympathy goes to her children David and Louise and their families.

Chapters cover amongst other things threading the loom and sleying the reed, tying up new warps, the automatic warp tension system and two or more warps.

Starting with rib and basket patterns, the reader sees how two harness weaves can be extended into 6, 8, 10 or 12 harness weaves. There is also a thorough discussion of twills and then you can explore block designing and what you can do with it as a multiple harness weaver.

Spinning Study Group 2020



TRADING TABLE NEWS and JOB ADVERTISEMENT

January 2020

The beginning of a new year seems a good time to write an explanation of what the Trading Table is all about and what it does.

The Trading Table was born from an idea I got when visiting New Zealand in 2001 and this is how it functions.

Guild members bring along their surplus equipment, or even items they have made and would like to sell. They put a price on the item and when it is sold. the Guild gets 10% and the remainder is paid to the seller on the day. This generates quite a neat little income to the Guild as the Trading Table does not have any outgoing expenses.

The following is a list of what you may bring along to sell.

You can bring any fibre related goods but we have also been known to sell the odd bit of pre-loved "kitchenalia" such as fancy jars, interesting small china pieces, spice canisters and such and of course we sell fibre related books. We do sell the odd larger piece of equipment such as inkle looms, Rigid Heddle looms, warping boards and even the odd spinning wheel, but these pieces are too large for us to store so if they are not sold on the day, we ask that you take them home at the end of the meeting. However, you can bring these items back at the following meeting.

I hope this answers any questions new Guild members might have, but if anything is unclear, please don't hesitate to ask me.

Now that I have explained the Trading Table I need to come clean and inform any members who were not at the last meeting of 2019 that for personal reasons I am retiring from my job as Trading Table organiser and we need someone to take over. It is not an onerous task and over the years there have been many helpers. Gail has been an invaluable help for several years, and is happy to continue to help, but is not able to take over the running of the Trading Table at present.

Please think about volunteering for the job, it is quite a lot of fun, you get to meet practically every member of the guild and make a substantial contribution to guild finances.

Weaving workshops 2020

Belinda Rosee of FibreLicious has secured Stacey Harvey-Brown (The Loom Room, France), as the International Weaving tutor for 2020, and will be bringing Stacey to Australia in August 2020.

For those who are not familiar with Stacey, she has been teaching weaving since 2005, firstly at The Loom Room in the UK, and now from her new studio near Nerac, in the heart of Gascony, SW France.

The two workshops being offered are:

- 1. Three Techniques for Texture Workshop—Texture in weaving can mean creating a flat tactile surface, but it can also mean so much more than that... What if you could create ruffles and seersucker, rocks and rills, lava flows and tree bark?
- Honeycomb Hybrid Workshop—Honeycomb is very versatile and crosses many perceived boundaries in weave. This workshops is packed bull of variations and forays into different subject areas such as DDW, honeycomb lace based on overshot threadings, huck lace, weft-faced motifs as well as designing for traditional honeycomb with a twist.

Both of these workshops are round robin style workshops over a two day period. The cost is likely to be around \$150 to \$200 per workshop.
