- Dark and light grey: the majority koala coat colour
- White: for the speckles or patches on the rump, chest area and inside ears
- Black: for the nose
- Pink: for the skin colour around the nose and mouth
- Dark brown: for their eyes
- **Green:** for eucalyptus leaves, which is their main diet and dwelling tree.

Said Marie Lawson "Often, the threads depict years or dates or something like that. In this case, if you can see the middle squares, you can just make out a little koala face."

Koala style

Marie Lawson weaving in her corrugated iron studio (Photo: Kemii Maguire, ABC)

The Lawsons learned to weave at Tafe more than 20 years ago, and have since created 10 registered tartans, including one for the Queen.

The koala tartan took several pattern trials, and was on public display before being approved by the World Scottish Tartan Register. The Lawsons chose the colours and pattern very carefully, to comply with the sequence set by the World Scottish Register of Tartan and reflect the colours of the koala and its habitat.

In October 2021, after two years of scrutiny and deliberation, the World Scottish Register of Tartan officially recognised a new tartan: the official tartan of the koala.

The first of its kind in the world, the tartan was created by siblings Fred and Marie Lawson in their home weaving studio (a corrugated iron shed in Gunnedah, New South Wales).

They hope that it will bring greater awareness to koala conservation.

A very colourful sharing table to end the year on!

Sue Webb knitted a cardigan in merino, cashmere, silk and angors using fibre dyed on commission by Charly McCafferty of Ixchel and the pattern "Spirited" by Elena Nodel. Sue spun and chain plied the laceweight yarn (approx. 680m per 100g).

More cashmere! **Shona Mac Donald** wove this cashmere scarf in a twill weave. A gift for a lucky friend, using the colours of Scottish and WA wildflowers.

Gail Hamilton has been very busy knitting, and had several colourful items on display, including this shawl knitted in Dingo Dyeworks yarn, using the "Nurmilintu" patterns by Heidi Alander.

In 2020 Gail knitted this lacy

shawl, but has only just gotten around to blocking it! The yarn is Fyberspates Gleam lace, and the pattern came from the Duchess knit along.

Gail used yarn from Circus Tonic and the "Snark-o-meter" pattern by Casapinka to knit the amazing scarf on the from cover, and used her leftover yarn and the "Rose Bowl" pattern by Veera Valimaki, a great stash buster!

Sue Greig has been stash busting too—she wove this scarf in cotton, acrylic and lurex on her rigid heddle loom.

Helen Lovitt-Raison has been knitting—she brought in this Stephen West shawl in wool, and another shawl in purple wool/silk from Fyberspates using the "Hortensie" pattern by Regina Schoenfeldt.

Helen also knitted this warm green jacket in the "Margarete" pattern by Sue Grandfield and yarn from Wollmeise.

Helen Gladstones knitted this cosy green cardigan—the pattern is her own design, and the yarn is Bond wool, handssun from a combination of "Budgie" and "Atlantic Deep" colourways by Southern Cross.

Helen also wove two scarves in silk/seacell using a pre-wound Saori warp—one plain, one twill.

Rachel Meissner handspun and chain plied this yarn using an interesting combination of llama, Shetland and merino.

And last but not least, **Brenda Roy** has been dyeing silk, velvet, cotton and linen fabric offcuts and handspun skeins using logwood and madder root.

"Knitted Animals and Other Australian Wildlife" By Dulcie Tanner

Here are 15 wonderfully creative patterns for knitting animals and other Australian wildlife, many suitable as toys, all suitable as gifts and decorations. Dulcie Tanner has designed her creations to be as lifelike as possible, using accurate colours and shapes featuring all the feathers, spines, scales and fur of the originals.

The patterns in the book are written in a clear manner and they are graded throughout the book, from simple to more complex, so all

knitters will find a pattern to suit their ability. This book is a delight with eye-catching photographs of all projects including: Boobook Owl, Kookaburra, Eastern-barred Bandicoot, Bilby, Desert Mouse, Brush-tailed Possum, Wombat, Numbat, Crocodile, Rainbow Lorikeet, Sugar Glider, Kangaroo, Shield Bug, Echidna, Emu and Chicks.

Dulcie Tanner has been knitting all her life but began creating knitted animals and birds about 6 years ago. Her work has featured in magazines, including The Australian Women's Weekly, and her patterns are in great demand.

Knitted Animals

"Shadow Weave Simply" By Susan Kesler-Simpson

Susan's approach is to break down the structure of shadow weave so that any level of weaver can

understand how alternating light and dark threads in both warp and weft can present a dominant motif outlined by an identical shadow.

She walks you through how the structure builds and weaves. Once you comprehend how the weave structure works, you will be able to weave any of the 25 patterns in the book and transform other drafts to shadow weave or design your own shadow weave pattern.

Susan Kesler-Simpson is the author of the successful Overshot Simply and has a BS and MA in clothing, textiles, and design from the University of Nebraska.

dance costumes and as casual wear. They are gifted during special occasions and used to add a unique Tuvaluan décor.


