

The Trading Table is having a BIG Birthday this year!

Recently our guild has been fortunate in being able to welcome an impressive number of new members and as this is also the year that the Trading Table reaches its 15th birthday I was prompted to write this explanation of what the trading table is and what it does as I'm sure some of you have wondered what we are all about.

The Trading Table was born from an idea I got when visiting New Zealand in 2001 and this is how it functions.

Guild members bring along their surplus equipment, or even items they have made and would like to sell. They put a price on the item and when it is sold. The Guild gets 10% and the remainder is paid to the seller on the day.

This generates quite a neat little income to the Guild as the Trading Table does not have any outgoing expenses. This year, up to and including the takings for July, the Trading Table has been able to give the Guild \$400.00

And now to answer the question of what can members bring to sell?

You can bring any fibre related goods but we have also been known to sell the odd bit of pre-loved "kitchenalia" such as fancy jars, interesting small china pieces, spice canisters and such and of course we sell fibre related books.

We do sell the odd larger piece of equipment such as inkle looms, Rigid Heddle looms, warping boards and even the odd spinning wheel, but these pieces are too large for us to store so if they are not sold on the day, we ask that you take them home at the end of the meeting. However, you can bring these items back at the following meeting.

At present we are a bit low on "stock" so anything you have at home that fits into the above categories would be very welcome indeed.

The table began with just one person helping me, but over the years I have had various helpers and just now we often have four of us ready to serve and help

with any questions. There is my sister Lilia and friends Shelley and Gail. I'm very grateful for their help and their deputising for me on the odd occasion when I am unable to get to the guild.





Carol was persuaded to show us her beautiful wrap plain woven in soft, rich, red wool with a subtle stripe.







Letters to the Editor...

From Mary Boyle:

I am interested in Giuliana Bond's socks (in previous editions of the Yarnspinner) incorporating her favourite 'afterthought heel' and I wonder if it is similar to mine. I have been knitting 5 ply washable Bendigo Mills wool for years in 'Richard Of York Gave Battles In Vain'* colours, although I do not stick to the Golden Rule.

FOR THE HEEL: I use size 13 needles (2.25mm) and my required number of stitches is 34.

Row 1 (knit): slip the first stitch and knit into the back of the last stitch.

Row 2 (purl): slip 1, purl to the end of the row.

Repeat the two rows and you will have a reinforced heel.

*(Ed. had never heard this phrase before – the internet tells me it stands for ROYGBIV, the colours of the rainbow)

From Jayne Hogan:

I came across this painting in an old Dutch magazine. The caption that came with it reads:

Helen Lovitt showed us a resplendent wrap. Spindle spun and knitted fine falkland wool in yellow/orange to


