

#### 25 November 2017: Guild Annual Stocktake

November is the time to return your library books and equipment hired from the Guild. The last possible date to return them this year will be the Guild's clean up and stock take day: **Saturday, 25 November, starting at 10am**. APCH will also be open for those who would like to spin.

LIBRARY BOOKS: If you'd like to volunteer to help out at the stocktake, you can borrow library books over the summer break.

HIRE EQUIPMENT: All hire equipment ( wheels, looms, combs, carders etc.) to be returned for stocktaking on 25 November. Items can be taken out for use over the holiday period but hire fees must be paid up until Feb.

#### From the President

Another Perth Royal Show over and hopefully everyone's entries have by now found their way home. Congratulations to all the winners and to everyone who entered.

We also had a successful Annual Guild Showcase and the committee has discussed what kind of tweaks we might make to encourage more entries in the spinning section. I think we were unanimous in removing the requirement for a swatch to accompany the skein. Other than that it is still recommended that the entrant provide information about the entry and a sample of fibre with the skein. This should simplify the category and we hope people will be encouraged to enter next year.

I just wanted to thank Petah from Dingo Dyeworks for coming and talking to us about her work at the October General Meeting. Petah was, as ever, interesting, informative and very generous with her knowledge and time. It was a pleasure to have her with us. We also had an excellent pop-up workshop from Keilo Wise on beaded knitting which proved very popular.

We have mentioned the potential increase in fees by the APCH and an increase in Guild fees for some time now. The increase by the APCH has been approved and will take effect for 2018. The committee been looking at both the increase of fees to us, considering what we are offering members and the potential costs involved in streamlining and increasing services to members. We have also taken into consideration the prices of like organisations and the fact that, at \$40 per annum, we are by far the cheapest organisation of our type in the state and Nationally the cheapest Guild of our type. Whilst we do have money in the bank we don't want to find ourselves in a situation whereby we increase services and expenditure and find ourselves running short.

To bring us into line with like organisations the committee has approved an increase of full member fees to \$50 for 2018 and \$65 for 2019. This will take effect in 2018 but if you rejoin before the end of the year you will obviously get 2018 at current prices. You will receive renewal forms before the end of the year and I encourage you to take advantage of this. Your membership renewal forms will be sent out before the end of the year and you can come and hand them in at any meeting other than the 60th Anniversary Lunch.

Our AGM is going to take place in March instead of the March General Meeting from now on as part of the changes necessary to ensure that we comply with the new constitution requirement.

This is because we need to give on month's notice of the nominations for committee positions and whilst we will be encouraging people to nominate early we think it most likely that this will only be finalised by the February General Meeting. We then need to publish this information in advance of the AGM. To the committee it appears most practical that we comply by pushing the AGM back one month to ensure that this runs smoothly.

If you are interested in being on the committee then please let us know so that you can be included in the nominee list. It would be appreciated if nomination forms could be returned by the middle of January if possible.

Our February meeting will be a special welcome back for 2018 as a bring a plate and we will have Olivia Doran as our speaker. Olivia is part of the Korowai Weavers (Maori Cloak making) who meet down in Warnbro and she will be telling us all about this wonderful craft and bringing some examples of their work. Hopefully some of the other ladies from that group will be joining her as our guests.

The Spinning Study Group will be reopening for those who want some company and feedback whilst doing the NSW Guild Certificate of Competence in Handspinning. Please email me if you are interested or come and have a chat with me or the ladies involved in running it at one of the meetings. I can be emailed at: <a href="mailto:candacegibson@yahoo.com">candacegibson@yahoo.com</a>. This group is open to Guild members and costs \$20 per year to cover the hire of the studio. While the course PDF is free participants are responsible for their own additional costs in pursuing the course and this is likely to include fibre initially and then postage, NSW Guild Fees and Assessment fee should they wish to submit their work for assessment.

We are gearing up for another busy year and we are so delighted to see so many of you at meetings or hear from you in regional areas.

**Kjerstin B** wove wonderful scarves, using the same alpaca warp for both but the one done in plain weave had a wool weft, and the twill scarf, a silk and tencel weft. She also showed a luscious alpaca skein.





Rae Flanagan had crocheted a multi-coloured shawl using commercial wool, and a knitted wool capelet.

**Helen Lovitt-Raison** knitted a great cosy beanie using a Cleckheaton Superfine pattern. She mentions that in the 44-row rib she made a one-stitch mistake and didn't notice till she cast off; haven't we all done that at one stage of our knitting careers!?



**Noreen Collins** showed us some workings she'd done with her own hand-spun.

Marg PC brought along some plaited indigo-dyed tops over-dyed with onion skins and soursob/oxalis.





## Sharing Table—Saturday 14 October

Two beautiful knitted shawls, one from Candace Gibson – "Voyager MKAL", merino from Jimmy Bears wool, - (photo shows knitted detail—see front cover), and one from Helen Lovitt-Raison, "Across the pond".

Gail Hamilton (busy girl!) produced some skeins of wool partially indigo- dyed and spun up with difficulty, as it had matted slightly in the wash and had to be tugged apart for spinning - pretty though. She had also knitted a very snappy cardi, yarn from Dingo Dye Works and a cute little "Milo Bambino" baby tabard for a friend's first baby with wool from Bendigo.



**Kirrin Lill** solar-dyed merino roving using soursob/oxalis; she couldn't believe her eyes when she saw the result!

Marg PC overdyed some plaited merino tops (that had initially been dyed with dried aloe leaves) with purple onion skins — tiger tails!; also more tops using the exhaust from the onion skins and half a bottle of cochineal from the pantry.

#### Shetland lace


We are used to seeing Shetland lace in shawls, but it has many other potential applications...fencing for example.

This beautiful fence is the creation of Anne Eunson of Hamnavoe, Burra, Shetland. It was knitted using specially adapted curtain rods as knitting needles, and the same twine used to make fishing nets.

It took Anne about three weeks to knit enough lace to surround her front garden, using a 23 stitch repeat of a familiar Shetland lace pattern.




#### Knit One Purl One Chris Webster

## Weaving in high places!

The Q'eswachaka (meaning 'rope bridge') which spans the Apurímac Canyon in Peru is the last remaining hand woven Incan bridge. Every June for more than 500 years an annual ceremony has been held to destroy and rebuild the bridge. Local villagers use grass to braid rope and weave matting to make suspension cables and decking for the bridge, which

spans more than 35 metres and hangs 20 metres above a rushing river. The bridge is then christened with a traditional Incan bridge blessing.

During Incan rule there were many of these hand woven bridges, and they were an integral part of the extensive Inca road system. Bridges of this type were useful since the Inca people did not use wheeled transport (traffic was limited to pedestrians and livestock) and they were frequently used by runners to deliver messages throughout the Empire.

Handwoven bridges were held in very high regard by the Inca—the punishment for tampering with them was death. Participating in the annual bridge weaving ceremony was considered a social obligation (like a tax) under Inca rule. Today it is done to keep the bridge weaving

tradition alive.
