

Scarf Exchange

The 2021 29th International Scarf Exchange was hosted by a consortium of spinners and weavers groups from the Shoalhaven area on the south coast of NSW, with the theme of 'Coastal'. All 139 entries are now on display online. Go to: internationalscarfexchange2021 - International Scarf Exchange 2021 on-line exhibition (google.com)

This is how it works: Each participant sends 150g of fibre to the host group, to be randomly distributed to another participant to be spun, woven, knitted, crocheted, felted or otherwise transformed into a scarf, hat, wrap, mittens, or socks (extra fibre can be added if required).

The finished items are all sent back to the host, displayed (online and/or in real life) and redistributed back to the person who sent the original fibre.

Think you'd like to take part? You can now register for the 30th International Scarf Exchange, which will be hosted by the Shepparton and District Handweavers and Spinners Guild. The theme for 2022 is 'Let's brighten up winter!'.

The Tuesday Weavers and the Tapestry group have begun a new 'share and tell' segment over the last few weeks. Each time we meet someone brings a selection of their textile related works over the years. A small scale retrospective for us all to enjoy and learn a little about each other's background,

passions and projects created over the years.

Liz astounded us with her array of printed garments and home textiles, most from the time she started her business in fashion and homewares under the "cocoon" label. After cutthroat changes in the fashion industry took the joy and the viability out of that, she changed tack and now has a shop "Woven Stories" (more information: wovenstories.com.au/) selling handmade fabric and has returned to making individual garments.

In October the weaving group took a break from the usual format and members brought along and displayed clothing that they had made from their weaving.

It was entertaining with members telling the stories of how the particular garments had come about, often intending to be something else but upon reflection we're made into a different garment. A planned skirt became a vest etc.



Stories included the acquisition of the yarn used, or the loan of a loom from a contact in Switzerland when

the weaver was in Milan without access to one.

In some cases, woven fabric was displayed and the weaver sought and gained insight into how it could be used to create a garment.

Beth gave us a discussion on Saori weaving and showed us many vibrant garments that she had made and promised to bring her loom to show the group when she has it warped.

Discussions emanating from the displays provided many helpful hints to those of us who are yet to tackle the task of making clothing from the loom.
