Gail Campbell wove a) a fabulous shadow weave silk scarf using thick & thin cream silk for both warp and weft b) a collection of plain weave and twill tea towels using cotton odd balls found by her niece during a charity shop expedition and c) a blue


lace weave tea towel for herself – a double -thick weft making it extra-absorbent.

Sue Greig wove a) a "Summer and Winter" bath mat and hand towel to match the tiles in her bathroom b) She had blended oddments of wool, mohair and silk, on an Ashford blending board and spun into some delicious skeins. To top all this off Sue also knitted c) a mohair/acrylic scarf – Shetland pattern 'Cat's paw'.



Hooray! Kat Sherwin finished spinning an interesting fine cobweb hank (spun from the fold) - it has taken her eight years to do from start to finish! (Oh what a feeling!!)

Rachel Meissner completed two knitted projects; a) a Boxy jumper using Dingo Dyeworks 'Ridgy Didge', and b) a 'Walk your Way' club shawl using Wollmeise merino, cashmere and nylon blended – a lovely colour-combo.



Gail Hamilton knitted a) an eye-catching shawl using Dingo Dyeworks wool "Advent calendar", pattern by Ambah O'brien. Gail told how every colour-change was separately wrapped so it was an exciting adventure to open each package as she came to it. There was also b) a pretty top in

> "Frankford" pattern. The two skeins we're not the same but Gail was happy with the result as it looked as though there was deliberate 'fade' effect.


#### The art of the KoroWai

On Saturday 10 February members were treated to a fascinating talk about Maori weaving by Te-Anau Merito from the Gnullar Mia Maori Woman's Welfare League Perth.

Te-Anau weaves KoroWai, traditional Maori shawls, using a combination of modern materials and traditional methods. KoroWai were once only made for dignitaries, but their creation is now an inclusive art form. Each Korowai is given a name by its maker, and is woven from bottom to top – ground to sky—see pictures on page 6.

# Silk: From the Myths & Legends to the Middle Ages Priscilla Lowry



## "Tablet" weaving

A discussion on Stock take day led me to these ruminations!

What do the words "tablet weaving" mean to you? I suspect it will have something to do with the length of time you have been a Guild member and whether you are interested in technology or archaeology.

Tablet weaving (also known as card weaving) is not new, only the way it is done. Centuries ago the Vikings did tablet weaving and so it spread over Europe. They used available materials (e.g. wood, bone) to make small square tablets

with a hole in each corner. The warp passed through these. The number of tablets determined the width of the braid and the pattern was made by twisting the tablets forward and backward in a planned routine. Nowadays, the tablets are usually strong card.

And the modern "Tablet". This rectangular piece of electronic wizardry can spit out information instantly on a myriad of matters at the touch of a button. Mind you, one still has to wind the warp, decide which colour option you prefer, thread the loom, change the levers, follow the pattern instructions but the thinking part seems minimal. It has equal success in guiding the craftsperson



through other crafts such as knitting. Probably the modern tablets could tell you how the Vikings used their tablets – or you could borrow a book from the Guild Library!!





### Reach for the stars in 2018

The Alice Springs Beanie Festival is an important annual event in Australia's textile calendar. It began in 1997 with a 'beanie party' and became an event to sell beanies crocheted by Aboriginal women in remote communities. It has grown into a fun festival where Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal artists share their culture and exhibit together.

So why beanies? Hand made beanies have long been valued in Central Australia – especially on cold winter nights in the desert. Craftspeople from remote areas and Alice Springs have taken up the challenge to raise beanie making into a distinctive regional art form. Through the festival beanies are used as a way to promote community participation in the arts, reduce poverty and dependency by developing artistic and entrepreneurial skills, and promote reconciliation.

The 2018 Festival will be from **29 June to 2 July**. This year's theme is **reach for the stars**. there are many awards up for grabs, including the Ziggy Stardust Prize (for a beanie celebrating space travel, science fiction worlds and pop culture characters), and the Night Skies Prize (for a beanie celebrating the moon and constellations, indigenous and non-indigenous astronomy and navigation, and our love of a campfire under a night sky). There are also awards for felting, embellishment, knitting/crochet, kids, and even the best tea cosy that reaches for the starts! The closing sate for entries (for competition or sale) is **25 May**. The program of workshops and events will be released in April 2018.

#### From the archives:

# First published in the Yarnspinner over several months in 1974-75

#### DYE PLANT OF THE MONTH - Chrysthanemums.

Gold, bronze and yellow flower heads give the best results, if the wool is mordanted with alum a very soft and pleasing shade of green is obtained. If copper or iron is used, a primrose colour is gained. The flowers are best when partly opened but it is hard to pick them for dyeing at this stage, so compromise with older blooms.

#### DYE PLANT OF THE MONTH

MARIGOLDS - Use 500 grams of flowerheads to 500 grams of wool, soak the flowers overnight then slowly bring to the boil and simmer for twenty minutes.

Colours to expect - with Alum Orangey - yellow with Chrome Yellow-green with Tin Bright orange

Try dyeing some camel hair using the same recipe.

#### PLANT DYE FOR THE MONTH - SUNFLOWERS (Helianthus annuus)

Common sunflower plant, which will produce a yellow dye extract. Allow  $1\frac{1}{2}$  quarts dry sunflower heads to 1 lb of wool.

#### PLANT DYE FOR THE MONTH - Water Lily Rhizomes

If you know of, or have a fish pond, it is probable that the water lilies within are being divided, if the roots or rhizomes are chopped up and simmered for some hours, varying shades of grey through to black are possible. Traditional tartans are supposed to have obtained their black colours from such rhizomes.

Dye-plant for the month...Golden Rod (solidago) a tall narrow plant with yellow flowerets forming a feathery head. A perennial, it may be found in many older gardens. Mordant..Bichromate of Potash. Use the flowers as they are about to bloom.
