


Sharing Table—Saturday 12 & 26 February



A couple of busy share tables to kick start 2022!

Gail Hamilton brought her very cute Pim Est Un Gnomes (pattern: Knit Joyz), constructed using various sock yarns. For

the Sockmadness 2021 Advent Scarf **Helen Lovitt** -Raison knitted a warm wool cowl using fair isle (stranded) and Japanese stitches. She also





glowing orange/green shawl using handspun Unicorn tops (each colour divided into two then plied together). Sue also brought along 8-ply wool samples dyed with Brenda Roy over the summer break, as well as some skeins she dyed by soaking unwound fibre cakes in water, sprinkling with Landscape dyes and microwaving each side for 2 mins! Brenda Roy brought some intricate inkle bands woven using commercial merino 4 ply, plant-dyed in logwood, indigo, madder, cochineal and pomegranate. She also brought a bag sewn from old cotton sheets and linen dyed in indigo with overdyed patchwork pockets. Marg PC wove a lovely shawl in neutral and blue/mauve tones, and also brought some very sturdy knitted socks! (see over for pictures). Continued on the next page...

Lincolnshire woman, 101, knitting clothes to send to Ukraine



A 101-year-old woman in Spalding (UK) is knitting clothes to send over to Ukraine as she remembers the "heartache, the pain and worry" she felt when she was separated from her husband for three years during World War II.

Elsie Pepper is part of a team of volunteers helping local craft store The Craft Outlet to knit hats, scarves and gloves, to help Ukrainian refugees.

Russia's invasion of Ukraine has brought the feelings back to the fore again for Elise Pepper, who remembers the "fear and loneliness like yesterday" of when she was separated from her husband George during the war.

Family-run business The Craft Outlet also has a personal connection to the tragic situation as manager Eric Pepper's wife Natasha, 50, who moved to Lincolnshire in 2006, is from Ukraine and has a lot of family and friends still in her home country.

In a few days they will be collecting Natasha's 83-year-old mother from the Ukrainian border and whatever is knitted by then will be transported, with more to follow in the coming weeks.

Elsie, who retired to Lincolnshire from London with her husband George, said: "At 101-years-old you'd be correct in assuming I've seen many things in my time. In WW2 as a young woman me and my husband were separated by war for three years.

"I remember the heartache, the pain and worry. Perhaps most of all I remember the fear and loneliness like yesterday. It never leaves me.

"Today we see the same happening here in Europe before our very eyes as families are wrenched apart through no fault of their own.

"I remember the nation came together and each of us did the little we could do and a lot of little made a big difference. Please do the little you can do. We have a group of volunteers who will make sure it gets to the people in need. If I at my age can do a bit, then I'm sure you can too."

The Tapestry Group

Who are we?

We are a diverse group of people who have come to tapestry weaving from many directions. Some from loom weaving, who actually continue on their loom weaving path as well as doing tapestry. Others have just appeared and tell us they want to learn tapestry weaving, but with no previous experience.

Where and when do we meet?

We meet at the Guild rooms at APCH at the same time as the loom weavers. ie. 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of each month, starting about 9.30 to 10am. Some people who can't get to APCH for work or



other reasons meet at a suburban house, along with some of the Tuesday people on the 1st Wednesday of each month from 10am.

What do we do?

As well as continuing on our own personal explorations, some enter the AuNZ Challenge each year. This is a challenge organised by some weavers in Sydney. They set a theme and each weaver produces a 20 x 20cm (or smaller) piece. These are sent to Sydney and then sent around Australia for display at various locations, mostly Guild rooms. Before Covid they were taken to New Zealand and displayed there at many places. We also try to enter a group piece in the Guild Showcase each year (see last year's winning entry inset). But there is no compulsion to enter these fun activities. Whatever suits you at the time.

How?

Tapestry can be done on equipment as simple as a sturdy picture frame. Or on specialised tapestry looms. Have a look in the store room at APCH for a BIG loom.

Why?

Because we love it!! Despite the apparent simplicity it is a constant challenge to even the most experienced weaver. To get the design, colours, techniques used, etc all working together makes for a happy weaver.
