2022 GUILD ANNUAL SHOWCASE CATEGORIES, PRIZES and TROPHIES

General Notes:

- Two items can be submitted per member per category.
- Items cannot be entered in multiple categories.
- The item must have been completed by the entrant within 12 months of the entry date.
- Items must be submitted and prepared for judging <u>between 10:00 and 10:30am on</u> the competition day.

WEAVING:

Most votes receive a certificate, and voucher and the LYN WARING TROPHY.

SPINNING:

A skein, made from hand spun fibre, with attached sample and description of fibre and intended use. Most votes receive a certificate, and voucher and the **CECILE DORWARD TROPHY**.

DYEING:

Natural or chemical dyes permitted. The entry may be a skein or item of commercial or hand spun fibre. Most votes receive a certificate and voucher. No trophy

FELTING:

Most votes receive a certificate, voucher, and the BARBARA FREW TROPHY.

KNITTING/CROCHET:

Any handstitched item made from Hand spun yarn, spun by the entrant. Most votes receive a certificate and voucher. No trophy

NOVICE/JUNIOR:


Any item as per above categories, made by a first-time entrant or member under 18 years of age. Most votes for Novice entry receive a certificate and voucher and **Joseph Dennis Trophy.**

GROUP or COLLABORATIVE ENTRY:

A group entry is to be a single item or cohesive set of items showcasing any mixture of the Guild's core crafts of weaving, spinning, dyeing or felting, where a group is defined as three or more individuals (who do not need to be an official Guild group). Items may also be partly crocheted or knitted.

Note: items entered as a group entry CANNOT be also entered individually.

All created in very small batches so no two skeins are the same. Rainwater from their tanks and no "single use" plastic in the dyeing studio help ensure these yarns make minimal environmental impact. April was a bumper month for beautiful objects on the share table. Winter must be on its way! Helen Lovitt brought a stunning violet cardigan (much coveted by the Editor ©) using Wollmeise Pure yarn. Pattern: Boxed & Cabled. Helen also spun a 2 ply (1000m!) cake of yarn from an 'International Fibre of Mystery' (inset above).

Jo Rhodes (top right) knit a cozy, colourful beanie to brighten any winter's day.

The destashed wool roving used was felting during the spinning process, so Jo found a great way to salvage it—by plying it with cotton and bamboo yarns.

Sue Greig (second right) has also been busy and brought

along three gorgeous woven shawls in leftover wool/nylon sock, woven on a rigid heddle loom. A very inspiring use of leftover yarn.

Cecila Jordan (bottom right) not only brought her beautiful Saori weaving experiment (see front cover) but also some very cozy grey and yellow pants (see photo inset for more detail). The pants are the result of an experiment with a 4 shaft loom.

early!) pattern for her striking orange/black/grey socks.

Helen Lovitt also got involved in SM16. Clockwise from right is the pretty beaded ankle detail on her green/grey Ipomoea socks; Plaid Pocket Socks; and Engelkristall socks (both qualifiers).


