## Sharing Table—Saturday 24 March

Three people showed beautiful work at the Spinning Day.

On the table this month were three table runners by **Kjerstin Bjelland**, woven in twill. Quiet colour variation of linen and cotton across the warp gave a subtle interplay of pattern across their crisp surface.

**Helen Lovitt-Raison** showed us a wool cowl in a pattern called Spiral Escape by Martina Behm. It was knitted from a Strickmich! Club kit and looked very stylish on Helen. Also




shared, though not modelled, by Helen, was a blue beanie knitted in Superfine Merino which showed off three different patterns.

A pair of Space Frog socks was knitted by a less than happy **Marg PC** who said not enough twist to the yarn meant frequent splitting, "perhaps because of my left-handedness and needles".







## From the Library

## The Practical Spinner's Guide: Cotton, Flax, Hemp Stephenie Gaustad

Cotton, flax, and hemp behave very differently from wool, and special handling is required. Stephenie discusses how each fibre behaves and how best to work with them, specifically touching on trouble spots such as drafting and adding twist. She also covers finishing yarns—

cleaning, setting twist, and plying - as well as what dye processes are best for adding color. Finally, she includes a discussion of spinning for both knitting and weaving, covering fabric properties of each fibre, and what spinners need to take into account when using the yarn in a subsequent project.

#### Made For Movement Stephen West

The exploration of colour, drape, texture, and movement are the focus of this new book from knitwear designer Stephen West. Three shawls explore different construction techniques with linen, alpaca and wool. The buttoned Stringband cowl easily transforms into a stylish hat and the Shrowl is a combination shrug and cowl.




## Sharing Table—Saturday 14 April

up of circular shapes which is unusual for shadow weave.

'Pinky' and 'Walleroo', designed by Ambah O'Brien. She also showed us a huge hank having used the fractual spinning technique – most delicious! ('Treetops' colour 'Lush").

MargaretPC dyed the yarn for a pair of robust socks. Something loud and cheerful to wear with her usually murky colourchoices.

To add a light note to the day, **Giuliana Bond** put a mystery

hank on the table for us to inspect and guess the fibre. With most of us unable to 'get it' it took a while for someone to come up with the correct answer; chocolates were generously dispensed to the winner — and everyone else. Thanks Giuliana for the pleasant little diversion!

## A little luxury...

On a Saturday in March a 4th floor bathroom at the Guggenheim Museum in New York got a yarny makeover—a mystery yarn bomber covered a toilet with golden crochet.

This same bathroom has received a golden makeover in the past - in 2016 artist Maurizio Cattelan replaced a normal white toilet with a fully functional 18-karat gold one. For 12 months the public could Crochet experience the extravagant luxury of using Guggenheim Museum's fourth floor a golden toilet.

The Guggenheim commented that it "does not encourage unauthorized interventions; however, we are heartened that a visitor was so inspired by the Cattelan installation that they were moved to create one of their own."

While the identity of the yarnbomber is unknown, it is reminiscent of the Polish fibre and knitwear artist OLEK. OLEK uses yarn in spectacular ways, to create murals, cover objects, make political statements, and explore feminist ideals (Our Pink House pictured right). #### From the archives:

## First published in the Yarnspinner in March 1973

#### SPINNING A SOFT THREAD - A. GADSBY:

To spin a soft thread is not always easy but it is usually possible. If you can start off with a good, clean fleece of medium length so much the better, as this will cut down preparation time. As with most crafts it is a case of 25% inspiration and 75% perspiration, and in spinning this is mainly concerned with preparing the wool before you start spinning at all.

Firstly choose a good, sound fleece; preparation will consist of lightly combing the locks. If it is dusty and dirty a more thorough combing is necessary and you must discard all rubbish. A short fleece needs carding and one that is really dirty may need combing and carding.

Having thoughtfully prepared the wool you can start spinning; for a soft thread 1 make sure the drive band is adjusted so that the bobbin is only just rotating. This is where the careful preparation is appreciated because you can now concentrate fully on drawing out your wool evenly and smoothly. Any hesitation to attend to knots, seeds, lumps and other nuisances will result in over-spinning because you will hold on to the thread while trying to sort out the problem and still treadling! I keep two linen towels to put on my lap, one white, one dark, to contrast with the wool being spun - you can then see the wool fibres clearly, and are able to judge the amount to draw from the rolags or staple.

To sum up you need, preparation, practice and patience - and those are not lumps - they re vexture!!

It began in 1997 with a 'beanie party' and became an event to sell beanies crocheted by Aboriginal women in remote communities. It has grown into a fun festival where Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal artists share their culture and exhibit together.

So why beanies? Hand made beanies have long been valued in Central Australia – especially on cold winter nights in the desert. Craftspeople from remote areas and Alice Springs have taken up the challenge to raise beanie making into a distinctive regional art form. Through the festival beanies are used as a way to promote community participation in the arts, reduce poverty and dependency by developing artistic and entrepreneurial skills, and promote reconciliation.

The 2018 Festival will be from **29 June to 2 July**. This year's theme is **reach for the stars**. There are many space-themed awards up for grabs, for beanies made using felting, embellishment, knitting/crochet, kids, and even the best tea cosy that reaches for the starts! The closing sate for entries (for competition or sale) is **25 May**. The program of workshops and events will be released in April 2018.

Images of Finnish Olympians knitting are all over social media, and have been the catalyst for a knitting craze in Finland.

According to head coach of Finland's snowboarders, Antti Koskinen around half of the 102-strong Finnish team were knitting at these Games. He also said that the habit also helps him during competitions. "It has become something of a hobby for me. I mean I do it every four years ... it is a nice, Finnish thing ... it means no unnecessary chit-chat is needed."
