

INFORMATION FOR JUDGING

When asked to judge, a person will receive information as to:-

- The chosen theme for that year
- The details of criteria for the category he/she is to judge
- Need for all judges to confer together to decide on best Group, Mixed Media, and Novice entry
- The possibility of Highly Commending entries (verbal acknowledgement)
- The right to consider aspects other than those listed if they wish

JUDGING CRITERIA

WEAVING

- a. Suitability of sett, materials, pattern & weave structure to article design & theme
- b. Balance and regularity of weave, sett, beat and selvedge's when appropriate
- c. Originality and aesthetics
- d. Finishing and making up if applicable

SPINNING

- a. Entrant to attach a wool staple or other fibre sample on plain white card to item, naming the fibres in the yarn
- b. Aptness of item to theme for the year
- c. Suitability of fleece and spun yarn for end product, evenness of spin & ply
- d. Execution of finishes and finishing techniques
- e. Handle and presentation

DYEING

- a. May be commercial or natural dye.
- b. May be commercial or handspun yarn

FELTING

- a. Entrant should attach a staple of wool and/or other fibre used
- b. Consider degree of difficulty
- c. Aesthetics attention to proportions, trimmings and edges
- d. Technique use of appropriate fibre and its processing for end use

KNITTING/CROCHET

- a. Suitability of materials and pattern to item design and theme
- b. Suitability of spun yarn for end product
- c. Suitability of chosen knitting needles, or crochet hook
- d. Execution of finishes, finishing techniques, and making up, as applicable
- e. Handle and presentation

MIXED MEDIA

- a. Cohesiveness of the media used together in the item
- b. Quality of item, its finishing, overall presentation, and adherence to theme

NOVICE/JUNIOR: Judged according to the criteria for the category in which the item has been entered.

GROUP ENTRY: To be judged on quality of individual item(s), overall presentation, co-ordination of display and adherence to theme.

THE BOTHWELL SPIN IN—March 2017

It all started with a seemingly innocent question from the lovely Julitha Barber, was I thinking of going to Bothwell next year? What was this? I knew of its exist-



ence but not what it was about so some investigation occurred. I discovered that it involved spinning and travel to Tasmania. I felt sure I could not only accommodate both of those but also bring DH along for the ride. He considers Tasmania a second home and we have many friends who have moved or live there already from his caving and bush walking past.

My investigations didn't turn up a lot and the website was singularly unhelpful. I put in a question to the organisers who rang my home phone at 6am one morning, waking me from a deep sleep. I don't remember a word of what was said other than the apology for forgetting the time difference. Anyway, to cut a very long story short, we went. For those who know me, no bicycles accompanied us but bush walking paraphernalia was in evidence.



Due to the lateness of my decision, there was no room at the Bothwell end of town and we stayed in Hamilton over the Wild Fennel Café, a family owned business and well worth the trip on its own for the fresh made baked goods and their awesome mushroom pasta and homemade pies.

My overall impression of Bothwell, coming from the perspective of regular visits to Bendigo's awesome show, is of a small country town version of this. Registration gets you a goodie bag. I didn't register so I can't tell you much about that. Entry to the show, run in the grounds of the local high school, was

\$8. Big tip here, take plenty of cash as there are few holes in the wall (ATM's) to withdraw any around the town and none at the show. Many stands had some access to credit card options or could give you cash transfer details or PayPal in a couple of instances.

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There were demonstrations of spinning and dyeing as well as a competition for spinners – at this point I wished I could have had my wheel with me to have a go – but it was interesting to see all the different wheels in action. The longest thread competition – two sections of which were won by a Julitha Barber (sound familiar?) was interesting as was the themed competition. There were workshops to be done for little money – my friend and I made Dorset Button brooches for \$5 – and there was a fashion show which turned out to be a competition as well.



If I give little information or detail here, it is because most of these things were all run in the school gym. As you would know, these buildings are not made to be speaking or teaching venues other than for basketball, netball and, well, gym stuff - all hard surfaces and lots of echo. What with classes, competitions, a PA system blaring and all the visitors to stands around the perimeter of the space, it was extremely hard to hear what may be going on in your part of the hall. I feel this let down the display and classes held there and the organisers may wish to review the uses of this area for future shows.

Overall, I did feel it was value for \$8 but it wasn't what I had, or what my brain had lead me to believe I would see. I got to pat some alpacas, there was a stand overflowing with Cormo fleeces and many local yarn and independent dyers plying (pun intended!) their wares. Some skeins did come home with me I have to confess.


Gail Hamilton shared a shawl knitted Softies in Dingo Dyeworks and some skeins dyed with Procion dyes.


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
Margaret Groves brought a child's top in navaho-plyed wool.


From the Library

Respect The Spindle The Video Abby Franquemont

This is an excellent introduction for those starting to use spindles. The instruction is clear and friendly. There are useful and often neglected hints on things such as how much leader is best and making a firm ball from your singles. However it only covers standard drop/suspension spindles.

Knits From a Painter's Palette Maie Landra Discover the extravagant, colourful world of hand-dyed yarn and Maie Landra's acclaimed, beautiful Koigu Wool Designs. This book showcases some of Koigu's best known patterns including the 1998 Koigu Oriental Jacket, the Carousel Jacket and the Charlotte's Web Shawl.
