A big thank you to all of our speakers and pop-up workshop tutors, it really makes the general meetings interesting.



We have two spin ins coming up in the next couple of weeks and I know that you will all join me in wishing the Atwell Spinner's and the Augusta Spinners the very best with their events!

I just want to thank everyone who gave up their time to come and help demonstrate at the WA Craft and Quilt Fair. We also had a great day up at Toodyay Fibre Festival and are already welcoming people who discovered us there. Great to have some more new faces joining us.

WA Craft Show is on 3-5 August and we are demonstrating again. As usual the call for volunteers is out and if you are interested please email me at candacegibson@yahoo.com. You will get free entry and parking and a great day out. This is always a fun time and we usually have about 5 people per day on the stand. Great excuse to spend the day spinning or weaving.

The Perth Royal Show is coming up again—the cut off for entries is 31 July and you have until 12 September to deliver your entries so plenty of time to work on something (details on page 14). It has been wonderful to see the number of entries increase over the last couple of years. We have been asked to provide demonstrators to the Creative Crafts section so please email me and I will pass your details to our RAS Representative candacegibson@yahoo.com). If you miss out on that then we have also been asked if we can provide some volunteers to the Alpaca Association for their craft demonstration at the Royal Show so if you are interested in helping them out at the Royal Show then please let me know. You will get free entry to the show and they are great fun to spend the day with. It is my understanding that there are slots available for every day so first in best dressed.

We have signed a new lease which guarantees APCH a home for 5 years with an extension of another 5 years thereafter. The terms of the new lease mean that maintenance costs are now being passed back to us rather than being absorbed by the City of Stirling. I am satisfied that our staged increase in membership fees was the right thing to do as this enables us to both meet our obligations and plan for the future of our Guild. Looking at shearing in a whole new way...

It takes guts to get your gear off as it takes guts to talk about mental health.

That's the motto of the Naked Farmer, also known as Ben Brooksby, a 24 year old 5th generation farmer from St Helens Plains in Victoria. Ben's mission is to raise money and awareness around mental health in the agriculture industry. And his unique way of doing this is by getting naked.

To raise funds for the Royal Flying Doctor Service mental health unit the Naked Farmer put together a calendar with pictures of farmers (male and female) on their land, shearing, riding motor bikes, picking fruit – all wearing just their boots and hats.

For the 2019 edition the Naked Farmer will set off on an Australia-wide tour, beginning in June, to meet farmers who want to have their photo taken. The tour will include many stops in WA, from Esperance to Broome, and Ben hopes to educate people along the way about where their food and fibre comes from.

Sharing Table—Saturday 9 June

Obviously the late arrival of winter has spurred us on to get busy – a wonderful table of exciting inspired work to be seen this month.

Gail Campbell spun up 450 gms of wool from the fleece and a hank of stunning chocolate alpaca fleece. Gail also wove four Echo-weave tea towels on a 4-colour warp and a single-colour weft (see photo on front cover). Each towel used a different colour weft on the same warp, and the "Reflection Collection" pattern by Sarah Jackson on the web.

Rachel Meissner knitted a gorgeous "Citron" shawl using handspun Merino from the fleece, which she also hand-dyed. She also brought an alpaca hank – spun off hand-carded rolags - fleece from Nicolea, and a hank of Gradient-dyed yarn Corriedale+silk fibre from Hilltop Cloud.





Helen Lovitt wore a wool with silk (Bendigo) tunic, Karbeth Swan Dance by Kate Davies. She also knitted a hat and cowl as a test-knit designed by Ambah O'Obrien and spun several delicious skeins: BFL/Cashmere, Ixchel bunny blend, Bond, heavy lace fingering in Squawk and Dazzling plumage colours, both from SCF Club.

Gail Hamilton knitted a sweet jumper, "I spring" and a large, stunning "Suburban Wrap" both in Dingo Dyeworks and designed by Joji Lockatel. Gail

> also spun a plump skein of Corriedale alpaca and Merino and b) Corriedale.

> As always, Kjerstin didn't

disappoint with her woven

scarves, some in plain & twill - wool & alpaca warp and tencil weft, and others using handspun wool & silk, warp and weft.

Australia back on top in 2018!

The results are in: The Spinning Knitwits have won the 24th International Back to Back Wool Challenge, and regained the coveted Scottish Wool Centre's International Wool Challenge Trophy for Australia.

Each team included a blade shearer, a country of origin sheep and seven spinners (with spinning wheels) and knitters who follow the identical patterns to knit an adult size jumper, while also raising funds for cancer research.

The Australian team shore a Merino X Border Leicester Cross sheep and spun on Majacraft, Ashford & Kromski spinning wheels.

Results:

- 1st: Spinning Knitwits, Tocal Agricultural College, NSW, 6 h 8 min 37 sec
- 2nd: San Diego County Spinners, Bonita, California, USA 8 h 15 min 31 sec
- 3rd: PolyWesters, Lethbridge, Alberta, Canada 9 h 36 min 00 sec

The teams worked fast, but were unable to top the Guinness World Record Time of 4 h 45 min 53 sec set by a team from the Netherlands in 2017.



Guild Annual Showcase: NO EXCUSE

The theme for the 2018 Guild Annual Showcase is that there is no theme. Perhaps in previous years you didn't like the theme, or couldn't think of a way to demonstrate it in your work. Well this year there is no set theme—there is NO EXCUSE for not entering this year!

So start knitting, spinning, dyeing, felting and creating for the Guild Annual Showcase on **Saturday 8 September 2018**.

CATEGORIES, PRIZES and TROPHIES

General Notes:

- Two items can be submitted per member per category.
- Items cannot be entered in multiple categories.
- The item must have been completed by the entrant within 12 months of the entry date.
- Entrants are encouraged to attach an artist's statement to their entries, using the year's theme as inspiration if possible.
- Entries can be marked as not for judging if desired.
- Items must be submitted and prepared for Judging between 10:00 and 10:30am on the competition day.

WEAVING: THREE COMPETITION CATEGORIES

- Off loom weaving
- 2 Shaft, Rigid Heddle, or inkle loom weaving
- Multishaft manual loom weaving (excl computerised, mechanical, dobbytype looms)

Each of the above sections receives a certificate, and prize money or voucher. Judge to decide the best overall entry. The member submitting that entry then receives the **LYN WARING TROPHY**

SPINNING: TWO COMPETITION CATEGORIES

- 5 ply and under (14wpi or more)- minimum skein 25gr
- over 5 ply (less than 14wpi)- minimum skein 50gr

A skein made from handspun fibre, with attached sample and description of fibre and intended use. Each of the above sections is to receive a certificate, and prize money or voucher. Judge to decide the best overall entry. The member submitting that entry then receives the **CECILE DORWARD TROPHY**

FELTING:

Judge to select the best entry, which receives a certificate, prize money or voucher, and the **BARBARA FREW TROPHY**.

DYEING:

Natural or chemical dyes permitted. The entry may be a skein or item of commercial or handspun fibre and will be judged on the quality of dyeing only. Judge to select the best entry, which receives a certificate and prize money or voucher.

KNITTING/CROCHET:

Any handstitched item made from Handspun yarn, spun by the entrant. Judges to select the best entry, which receives a certificate, and prize money or voucher.

MIXED MEDIA:

An item made using predominantly any, or a mixture, of the core crafts of weaving, spinning, dyeing or felting, which can include any material, including (but not restricted to) recycled or up-cycled materials. The item can be in any form from garment, decorative, domestic, to sculptural. To be judged by all Judges together. Best entry receives certificate, and prize money or voucher.

NOVICE/JUNIOR:

Any item as per above categories, made by a first-time entrant or member under 18 years of age. Judges are to select the best Novice entry together, which receives a certificate and prize money or voucher.

GROUP or COLLABORATIVE ENTRY:

A group entry is to be a single item or cohesive set of items showcasing any mixture of the Guild's core crafts of weaving, spinning, dyeing or felting, where a group is defined as three or more individuals (who do not need to be an official Guild group). Items may also be partly crocheted or knitted. Note: items entered as a group entry CANNOT be also entered individually. To be judged by all Judges together. Best entry receives certificate, prize money or voucher and **TURNER COTTAGE TROPHY** (donated by Frank and Isobel McKay).

PRESIDENTS AWARD:

An entry chosen by the President of the day receives a certificate, prize money or voucher and **JOY SKINNER TROPHY**

POPULAR VOTE:

Members are to cast a vote for their selection. Votes are to be counted and the winner announced. Winner receives certificate and prize money or voucher and **ANNE RAIN TROPHY**

PATRONS CHOICE:

Patron to select their favourite entry, which receives a certificate, and prize money or voucher.

From the archives:

First published in the Yarnspinner in September 1975

QUESTION: A Jack-loom has been offered for sale; what sort of loom is this?

ANSWER: The word "Jack" refers to the mechanism which operates the shed action. In the jack-loom offered, the shafts are pushed up by the jack (wooden arms). The jacks are connected to lamms and the lamms to treadles. When the treadle is pressed the lamm is pulled downward and the jack is pulled on one side causing the other end to rise and push the shaft upward. The warp ends are raised. Therefore, Jack looms give a rising upward. Each harness works independantly enabling both balanced and unbalanced weaves to be woven easily.

Please have a go and be pleasantly surprised at what you can achieve.
