Sharing Table—Saturday 13 July

On the sharing table this month...



Two scarves from **Gail Campbell**, one of our skilled weavers, both intriguing in different ways: a deceptively simple plain weave white wool scarf which used plied and overspun singles to achieve a crinkle effect; and a scarf of blue

and pur-

ple in a twill pattern.

Kjerstin B, of unbounded skill, had two twill shawls, soft and subtle in texture and colour, of wool alpaca and cashmere.



Bronwyn brought her second and third attempts at weaving on her newly acquired Knitter's loom, 2 lovely shawls of her natural grey and



blue hand spun wool. Well fulled, soft and cosy (see front cover).

Cecilia Jordan shared her jumper/cardigan woven on a rigid heddle Knitter's loom of hemp, linen, silk, yak, camel cotton and other bits and pieces. She called it a stashbuster but

would call it a divine, inspired mixof wonderful softness and colour.

Rae Flanagan had two scarves, one of hand spun and the other of commercial yarn beautifully knitted. Cheery to keep winter at bay.





Beth Klokeid had brought the fabulous wrap in plain weave, colourful and Saorilike, which matches the stylish woven pants she was wearing. Both warp and weft were cotton of different weights and textures.

Helen Lovitt, indefatigable as always, shared her series of shetland hats in stranded



knitting on the theme of 'Roadside Beanie' for Shetland Wool Week.

Absolutely gorgeous and many guilders had their favourite but I had my eye on her slouchy beanie stranded knitted in wool and mohair in Kate Davies pattern Peerie Flooers. As well as these she had knitted a cute purse in green Shetland wool with a knitted lining.

Lastly **Marg P.C.** lamented with us her journey with the toe-up hateful socks. In wool mix, she told us the proportions turned out awful.

"The only good thing about these toe-ups is that cable needles and stitch markers fall into the sock and can't get lost!" In spite of this they are a beautiful blue/ turquoise/green length of vibrancy hanging waiting on those needles!

From the archives:

First published in the Yarnspinner in June 1974

Ponchos and their relatives are delightful winter garments, warm, comfortable and casual and they cover a multitude of winter eccentricities of dress. There are as many ways of making one as there are weavers so we are offering a few suggestions. If you are keen on double-weave or garments elaborately shaped on the loom write us an article on your method!!

The simplest design for a small loom is made in a length, cut in two and sewn according to our first diagram. This is a light, warm, cape-like cover with points at front and back and is best woven on a widely spaced (6 or 8 e.p.i) wool warp. Two shaft or four shaft looms are suitable. Exploit the casual nature of the garment by using colour, texture and weave to make each one unique. Soft wool, Mohair and/or camel hair wefts add luxury to the feel. If you used related colours you could explore twill treadlings to give great variety in the weave. A word of warning - the edges show, so be careful to keep your web a constant width if you change wefts dramatically. If you choose one overall colour - green for instance you could try for yarn and texture variations.

A type of varigated(space-dyed)wool in the Guild's yarn stocks makes a splendid choice for warp or weft. It is thick, soft, brightly coloured and it combines well with mohair or home-spun. A woven length of 80", 20" in the reed(at 8 e.p.i., 160 at 6 e.p.i., 120 threads) makes a generous size for quite a large person. Some books suggest 72" x 18.


If you have a wide loom a 40" wide piece, twice the length you require, will give you a traditional, straight front and back

garment. The space for the neck can be a woven slit - (do make it big enough - heads have quite a volume), a diamond shape or can be cut afterwards. Natural and earthy colours seem more fitting for 'ethnic' clothes like these! (10-14 e.p.i.?)

Of course two 20" strips can be sewn together - the seam covered with braid or an inkle band.

Fewer variations in weave or colour look better in this case and remember on a straight garment stripes should match. The following diagrams are meant to help you design something all your own.

"Spinners don't spin merino"

This was the accepted wisdom when Julitha Barber learned to spin in the 1970's. Back then many handspinners were spinning wool of at least 26 microns, and turning it into thick (if too warm for Perth's climate) jumpers.

Julitha visited the Guild on 13 July to tell us the story of how she started spinning fine, and came to be the holder of the 'longest thread' spinning record.

In 1978 Barbara Fowler, in an effort to raise funds to repair a church roof in her home town of Bothwell, Tasmania, held the first ever Bothwell

Spin In.

The Bothwell Spin In is now an internationally recognised event, held every two years, and attracting hundreds of participants.

In 1986 the 'Longest Thread' competition was added to the spin in.

the 'Longest she uses to break world records: a modified Ashford Traditional.

a beautiful lace scarf.

Participants had to spin 10g of fleece into the longest 2 ply thread they could, Julitha entered, and her 3rd place was

longest 2-ply thread they could. Julitha entered, and her 3rd place was "a red rag to a bull" - she was determined to win, and in 1987 she did.

Julitha has refined her wool preparation and spinning techniques since then, and these days she can spin 10g of fleece into over 900m of 2-ply yarn. Her aim is crack the 1km mark! She is currently the longest thread record holder.

Julitha was generous enough to share some of her tips and tricks for fine spinning. In summary: patience, black knee high stockings, good light, fine wool, black background for contrast with white wool, adapt your wheel to suit you, and more patience. Thanks Julitha, for a fascinating presentation!

Weaving workshops 2020

Belinda Rosee of FibreLicious has secured Stacey Harvey-Brown (The Loom Room, France), as the International Weaving tutor for 2020, and will be bringing Stacey to Australia in August 2020.

For those who are not familiar with Stacey, she has been teaching weaving since 2005, firstly at The Loom Room in the UK, and now from her new studio near Nerac, in the heart of Gascony, SW France.

The two workshops being offered are:

- 1. Three Techniques for Texture Workshop—Texture in weaving can mean creating a flat tactile surface, but it can also mean so much more than that... What if you could create ruffles and seersucker, rocks and rills, lava flows and tree bark?
- 2. **Honeycomb Hybrid Workshop**—Honeycomb is very versatile and crosses many perceived boundaries in weave. This workshops is packed full of variations and forays into different subject areas such as DDW, honeycomb lace based on overshot threadings, huck lace, weft-faced motifs as well as designing for traditional honeycomb with a twist.

Both of these workshops are round robin style workshops over a two day period. The cost is likely to be around \$150 to \$200 per workshop.
