# Sharing Table—Saturday 10 August



Sue Greig brought in three 8/2 cotton hand towels. The weave is an 8-shaft twill. Sue also shared two woven

scarves. One warped with handspun tops, plied with merino/Tencel. The pattern was a 13, 13, 12 Bronson Lace. The second was warped with silk/alpaca



handspun. The weft was merino/Tencel, woven on a rigid heddle loom using a 10 EPI sett.



Jessica chose a fantastic combination of blues when she wove her merino scarf.

Nada Murphy was kept busy using her spindle to spin brown merino, knitted into a lace patterned poncho. Nada has been heard many times stating that she's "Not going to learn to spin".



Giuliani was given some Afrino fleece by a past guest speaker. Locks were combed then spun and plied with a "Z" twist. The spun skein is very soft.



Rae Flanagan used handspun wool from her stash to knit up 2 different coloured scarves using the same pattern. Both were spun using an "S" twist.

Helen Lovitt used Martina Behm's pattern "Berry Skies" to knit her unique merino cowl. She used "Dibadu Funnies" twisted merino 4 ply yarn.

#### **Grow Your own Cotton:**

Adapted from YarnSpinner articles from Jun, Sept & Nov 2014

While most of us haven't got room in our gardens for a sheep or alpaca, we can still try spinning our own home-grown fibre. Several Guild members have successfully grown, harvested, and spun their own cotton.

According to Cotton Australia cotton is an annual crop that prefers hot summers, low humidity, and as much sunshine as possible. It should be watered regularly, but the soil allowed to dry out a bit between waters. Time from planting seeds to harvesting cotton is about 6 months. Seeds should be planted in September-November (when soil temperatures reach 14 degrees or more for three days in a row).

Flower buds develop a few weeks after the plant starts to grow, then flowers appear a few weeks later. The flowers then fall off leaving a ripening seed pod that becomes the cotton boll. Bolls can be picked as they are open and mature, around March-May. They are then 'ginned' – a process which separates the lint (raw cotton fibre), cottonseed and trash.







In 2014, Jo Rhodes began experimenting with germinating seeds inside on cotton wool, and then planting the seedlings in pots. Since then, Jo has continued to grow cotton annually, however she simply throws the seeds in the garden for the next crop as she "gins" the

current crop.

Jo advised that for a gravel and clay soil, pots will be a better option, suggesting to plant several seeds in each pot. Once seedlings have developed, remove the weakest ones. Jo also says that they like water and fertilizer!



## AuNZ Tapestry Challenge 'Celebrate'



Those members attending the August meeting at APCH were privileged to see the travelling exhibition that is the 2019 AuNZ Tapestry Challenge.

The challenge started in 2006 with an exchange of tapestries between Australia and New Zealand. Each year there is a theme, with the 2019 theme being "Celebrate".





The tapestries are exhibited at the Creative Fibre Festival in New Zealand each year, and also in Newcastle, Canberra, Sydney, Perth, Melbourne and Adelaide.

First: \$15, Certificate; Second: \$10, Certificate;





#### The Nanos have arrived...

Like several members of the guild, I was anxiously awaiting the arrival of my new baby, which like most human babies, took 9 months to gestate. This tiny e-spinner, called an "Electric Eel Wheel Nano", or simply "Nano", is the brainchild of US spinner and inventor, Maurice Ribble (dreamingrobots.com). Maurice ran a Kickstarter campaign in late 2018 to get backers. His campaign was looking for US\$15K in pledges, but attracted nearly US\$500K!





You can fit them in the palm of your hand and they run from either mains power or a battery charger. Mine arrived just in time for a grand unboxing at the last guild meeting. On my first spin, I managed to squeeze 57gms of superfine merino on a single bobbin, which resulted in just over 400 metres of laceweight yarn once plied. So far I'm very happy with my new baby.

## Weaving workshops 2020

Belinda Rosee of FibreLicious has secured Stacey Harvey-Brown (The Loom Room, France), as the International Weaving tutor for 2020, and will be bringing Stacey to Australia in August 2020.

For those who are not familiar with Stacey, she has been teaching weaving since 2005, firstly at The Loom Room in the UK, and now from her new studio near Nerac, in the heart of Gascony, SW France.

The two workshops being offered are:

- 1. Three Techniques for Texture Workshop—Texture in weaving can mean creating a flat tactile surface, but it can also mean so much more than that... What if you could create ruffles and seersucker, rocks and rills, lava flows and tree bark?
- Honeycomb Hybrid Workshop—Honeycomb is very versatile and crosses many perceived boundaries in weave. This workshops is packed bull of variations and forays into different subject areas such as DDW, honeycomb lace based on overshot threadings, huck lace, weft-faced motifs as well as designing for traditional honeycomb with a twist.

Both of these workshops are round robin style workshops over a two day period. The cost is likely to be around \$150 to \$200 per workshop.
