## **Sharing Table Saturday 25 July**



**Sue Greig** brought us a beautiful scarf woven in plaited twill from merino/Tencel hand dyed from a Canadian fibre artist and a very novel wool beanie knitted from the left over warp thrums from a blanket woven for her daughter-in-law.

**Brenda Roy** brought a drawstring bag woven in "ancient Rose" overshot of linen acquired in the dim past from who knows where which was such a painful warp that 80 % was cut off and the snarling beast thrown in the bin with great satisfaction! (see front cover for photo).





Helen Lovitt knitted a poncho in Bendigo luxury 8 ply from the 'Cusp' pattern in Brooklyn Tweed's Capsule Book, and lovely 'sockettes' in left-over yarn in 'Intersections' from 52 weeks of socks.

Marg PC also brought socks - three pairs. One pair cuff down with afterthought heel, one toe up with regular heel and toe, and 'left over' socks where she used up odd balls separated with 'fluffy' and changed the stitch

pattern with each colour change from 'A la Carte' sock pattern book. As well as socks Marg showed us her twill runner of handspun vegetable dyed wool now ready for last year's showcase entry! and a "lockdown" oddment double bed blanket knitted from boucle and textured wools, mohair and alpaca.

**Gail Campbell** had woven a wonderful bedspread of cotton in double weave adapted from a runner pattern in the Jan/Feb 2020 Handwoven magazine.

So a table full of beautiful things from leftovers as well as some new beauties! Thanks everyone for sharing your work.

## **Sharing Table Saturday 8 August**

Marg PC spun this gorgeous fibre consisting of a silk and merino blend acquired from the Guild shop which was plied with merino carded by Marg. Marg also knitted these unusual socks The blue has a daisy pattern knitted into the fabric and the fibre is Patonyle. The spiral sock can be knitted shaped or flat. See Marg for further details.

Two scarves and shawl were woven by **Karita Greatwich**. The lovely blue denim shawl was made with two shades of 8/2 cotton, measures approximately 50cm x 2.8m and the weave is Swedish Linen. The two woollen scarves each measure 2.5m x 25cm



and the weaves are variations on undulating twill. Very soft and warm.



**Gail Hamilton** knitted this gorgeous shawl—yarn from Dingo Dyeworks, pattern Stillness Mical by Helen Stewart. Amazing colours.

Margaret Jordan wove this bookmark in the Star of

Bethlehem pattern in tencel at 25 epi. The pattern called for the use of sewing silk and was much finer, so the pattern was adapted, reducing the number of repeats, but is still wide for a bookmark at 8x16cm plus fringe.

### A woolly good idea...

COVID-19 restrictions have meant a big increase in takeaway food, as restaurants have been required to close their doors and serve takeaway food only, or people prefer to eat at home rather than out. A lot of takeaway food is served in expanded polystyrene packaging (EPS), most of which goes to landfill (and does not biodegrade).

But what if there was a natural, compostable alternative to EPS packaging? What if we could wrap food in wool?



The insulative wool layer is wrapped in compostable plant-based plastic to make it 'food safe' (Photo: Planet Protector Packaging).

In July 2020 the ABC reported on research being undertaken by Planet Protector Packaging, an Australian company creating wool thermal packaging. Low quality wool "offcuts" (which would usually be thrown away) is being used to create packaging which keeps food warm, thanks to the insulating properties of the wool. Wool is also being used to package items such as pharmaceuticals, which need to be kept at a constant temperature.


Wool packaging has the advantage of being compostable (just throw it into your compost bin or garden when you're

finished!), and it is hoped that creating a demand for the wool offcuts will benefit tofarmers.

So watch this space – next time your order takeaway, it might arrive wrapped in wool!


## From the library

In memory of **Kath Trendell** the following books are from her personally published collection. They have beautiful illustrations, hand woven covers and are numbered - works of art in themselves.










### Knitting in Circles Nicky Epstein

### Super cotton!

Clothing can be pretty bad for the environment. Each year Australian's produce an average on 23kg of fabric waste per person, most of which is made of synthetic fibres (which break down into tiny plastic particles which can pollute the soil and water). Plus, the dyeing of fabric on a

commercial scale uses a large amount of water and often fairly toxic chemicals.

But what if we all wore more natural fibres, and they didn't need to be dyed at all?



Landline reports that the CSIRO is working on a new kind of cotton plant which makes colourful cotton that doesn't need dyeing. Instead of producing the standard white (or sometimes greenish and brownish) bolls of cotton, this new breed could produce bolls of whatever colour was in demand. Scientists are currently having early success with purple and orange, and are working towards the 'holy grail' – black.

In addition to breeding cotton with in-built colour, the CSIRO are also working on breeding new 'super-cotton' varieties to produce fibre that is more wrinkle resistant (less ironing – yay!) and with greater elasticity, to make cotton that can compete better with synthetic alternatives.

All of the cotton plant is used, there is no waste: The fibre is the primary reason for growing cotton. But the seeds are used for animal feed and human use (cottonseed oil). The plant stalks are tilled back in the soil after harvesting.

## The 2021 International Scarf Exchange

The 29th International Scarf Exchange is being hosted by a 'consortium' of groups resident in the Shoalhaven area on the south coast of NSW. They are Berry Spinners & Weavers Inc, Nowra Spinners & Weavers Inc and Wool Road Spinners & Weavers Inc, with help from Murramarang Spinners & Weavers Inc.

The aims of the Scarf Exchange are to preserve the skills of spinning, weaving, knitting, crochet and felting, expand the wool craft network and to challenge each crafter to produce their best original work. The theme chosen for 2021, which you may interpret in any way you wish, is very apt for our location:



Participation involves you selecting, and sending to us, **150grams of** washed and prepared fresh natural fibre which must be free from any contamination or strong odours. Please ensure that all fibre is very clean and already combed or carded. Also ensure it has not absorbed any odours including mothballs or similar as this may trigger asthma. Please contact the co-ordinator if you are unfortunate enough to receive fibre that does not meet these standards. It will be returned to the sender.

Your fibre will be crafted into a scarf, wrap, gloves/mittens or socks, by another randomly selected participant in the exchange. You will also be sent another participant's fibre that you need to craft into a scarf, wrap, gloves/mittens or socks, using a method of your choice, adding extra fibre, or colour as you wish but please take into account any preferences expressed by the sender of the fibre.

Registration is from 1 August 2020 until 30 November 2020.

### How to participate:

- 1. An entry form needs to be printed and filled out. Please ensure you take a photo or photocopy for your records.
- 2. The entry fee is to be paid either by cheque in Australian Dollars (AUD) included with your entry form or by electronic funds transfer (eft) instructions on the entry form (ENTRY FEE to help cover postage of both exchange fibre and finished item to you: Australia AUD\$20 New Zealand AUD\$30, USA AUD\$40, rest of world AUD\$50).
- 3. Send your fibre in a resealable bag with a fibre sample in a small separate bag, and a printed copy of your entry form to the address below **before Monday 30 November 2020**:

- 4. You will receive an exchange package of fibre plus a crafter sheet by the end of January 2021 and will then have 4 months to spin, dye, knit, crochet, felt or weave it into a wonderful creation to showcase the best of your fibre art talents.
- Deadline delivery date for return of your finished item, your crafter sheet and any excess fibre to the Wool Road Spinners & Weavers Inc is Friday 29 May 2021.
- 6. A virtual exhibition of all finished items is planned. Details to follow.
- 7. Finished items will be returned to participants by the end of July 2021.

From Natalie Raynor, Manager - Competitions, Events and Education, Royal Agricultural Society of Western Australia:


