

The Ann Bancroft Trophy for dyeing

After a long association with the Guild I thought the donation of a trophy to express my appreciation of that contact and friends made over the years might be appropriate. Perhaps one in the dyeing category would encourage more entries.



My dyeing memories go back to when I was an Occupational Therapy student and weaving, spinning and dyeing were required subjects. We heard of cochineal, madder and indigo etc. It sounded very exotic — alas, in theory only. Experience came later when I discovered the delights of the eucalyptus dye bath and dabbled with solar, chemical and fungi dyeing. Fun days when we boarded buses to Walyunga National Park and Turner Cottage, and obtained such a range of colours with the different mordants. A further memory was a group spring ramble in Kings Park accompanied by a botanist and a member armed with Kath Trendall's dye samples. Travels through WA were enhanced by watching for likely dye materials and experimenting with them.

Buying a spinning wheel in New Zealand was the first time I heard of 'Bancroft's mordant' and then I went home from Drabble House one Saturday with the Queensland book 'Dyeing for Fibres and Fabrics' and the penny dropped. Dr Edward Bancroft was the same American my late husband and his friends had told me about – invisible ink messages hidden in hollow trees on the gardens of the Tuileries in Paris where he was secretary to Benjamin Franklin and spying both for England and America at the time of the American Revolution. Bancroft was granted the license for the importation of quercitron (black oak bark) where it was used as a yellow dye prior to the discovery of chemical dyes. His son settled in Jamaica where Peter Bancroft was born 4 generations later.

Dr Edward Bancroft wrote of his research into dyeing in the 'Philosophy of Permanent Colours' in 1794 (updated in 1813). I corresponded with an American professor who regarded Bancroft as a brilliant dye chemist and related the tale of when he requested the book from his university library loan system, and received an original copy in the post, presumably very valuable. A distinguished colleague told him he should 'lose' the book and see what kind of fine the library sent – if it was \$500 'find' the book again, if it was \$50 then pay up. He kept the book for two weeks, copied it carefully, and returned it!

A member of the Innaloo Spinners is a gifted glass artist – Silvana Ferrario – and she has made a piece that is colourful and has a woven appearance. I hope it will be enjoyed.

Mrs Ruth Reid: Honorary Life Member

As a young woman, Ruth Fish was living and working in London during the World War II. By day she worked in a bank; by night she contributed to 'the war effort' as a volunteer fire watcher. A weekend visit to Brighton on England's south coast changed Ruth's life dramatically. There she met Gordon Reid, a young Australian Air Force navigator. They married in 1945 shortly after the war in Europe ended, and early the following year Ruth set sail to join her new husband in Australia as a British War Bride. This was the start of a journey which eventually took her to Western Australia's Government House and produced a family of two sons and two daughters.

Ruth Reid OAM has dedicated much of her life to community service as a volunteer to many not for profit organisations in Western Australia. The voluntary work for which she has been recognised includes her service to the Friends of the Battye Library of WA; being patron of Ed Connect (formally known as the School Volunteer Program); her work with UnitingCare West's Rainbow Project; the Royal Historical Society; Save the Children Fund; St John Ambulance, Westcare, the Blind Institute and last but not least 24 years as patroness of HWSDGWA Inc.

Ruth Reid was awarded a member of the Order of Australia in 2013 and in the same year announced winner of the Lifetime contribution to Volunteering Award presented at the WA Volunteer of the Year Awards.


In November 2016 Ruth was presented the prominent title of "Honourary Freeman of the City of Nedlands" by Kerry Sanderson, the then Governor of Western Australia. A maximum of only six living persons may hold this honour at any one time. An Honourary Freeman of the City must have served the community of the City of Nedlands in an outstanding and meritorious manner that stands above the contributions of most other persons, and whose activities have contributed significantly to the wellbeing of the City's residents.

We at the Handweavers', Spinners' and Dyers' Guild of Western Australia Inc. similarly wish to recognise the outstanding contribution made by Mrs Reid over her 24 years as our Patron. Ruth's attendance at and interest in our events and activities has been genuine and unflagging. Ruth you have always been an active participant in the life of our Guild. Mrs Reid, you are a much loved and valued member of our Guild and the community created by our common interests.



Guild Membership

With the adoption of our new Constitution this year, and leading into the membership renewal period, I thought it a good time to publish a summary of the HWSDGWA Membership rules.

Eligibility for membership

Any person who is interested in weaving, spinning, dyeing or the broader fibre and textile arts is eligible to apply to become a member. However, anyone under the age of 15 years is not eligible to apply for a class of membership that confers voting rights.

Applying for membership

A person who wants to become a member must apply in writing to the Guild. The application must include nomination by a current member, be signed by both the applicant and the nominator, and include the applicable membership fee. There is a Membership Form available for this purpose.

Dealing with membership applications

The committee will consider each application at their next meeting and decide whether to accept or reject the application, according to the rules of the Guild Constitution. New members will receive a 'Welcome Pack' upon approval and their name announced at the next General Meeting.

Classes of membership

The Guild has the following membership classes and their associated rights:

- **Ordinary membership:** An ordinary member has full voting rights and any other rights conferred on members by the Constitution, including access to all Guild ancillary services.
- Concessional membership: Applicable to any individual upon presentation of a concession card, these members have all the rights of an ordinary member.
- Family membership: Applicable to any single household of up to 2 adults and 2 children under the age of 18, this membership provides entitlement to all the rights as per ONE ordinary member.
- Honorary Life membership: These members have all the rights of an ordinary member. Life membership is awarded in recognition of a member's valued contribution to the Guild and involvement in promoting and advancing its aims and objects. Guild members may at any time recommend to the committee in writing, that a member be considered for life membership.

- Associate/Junior membership: Applicable to any individual who has not yet reached the age of 15 years, or upon request by any other person. Such a membership provides entitlement to all the rights of an ordinary member EXCEPT the right to vote or to contract to hire or loan from the Guild.
- Group membership: Such a membership provides entitlement all the rights
 of ONE ordinary member EXCEPT the right to contract to hire or loan from
 the Guild. This includes access to the Guild's public liability insurance for
 group activities. In addition, the Guild provides publicity and support to
 these groups and they are entitled to rent APCH premises at noncommercial rates.
- Affiliated Group: Any fibre or textile focused group, guild or organisation
 with whom the Guild wishes to reciprocate with news and information. Such
 groups, as approved at the discretion of the Committee, have no Guild
 membership rights or benefits at all but will receive a copy of the
 newsletter.

Membership fees

The committee will determine the annual membership fee based on projected operational costs of the Guild. The fees for the different classes of membership are expressed as percentage of the ordinary membership fee.

- Ordinary 100%
- Concession and Associate/Junior 80%
- Family and Group 150%
- Life and Affiliated Group- free

If a person applies for a new membership after 1st October, their membership fee will include membership for the remainder of the current as well as the following year. If a person renews their membership for the following year between 1st October and 31st December, they are entitled to a 10% discount. Under individual consideration of cases of hardship, the committee may resolve to allow for a reduced membership fee.

Membership renewal

The due date for membership renewal is the 31st of December, and if a member does not pay the fee and submit a renewal form their membership will expire on 31st March. Expired members must complete a membership application to reinstate their membership.

When membership ceases

As well as membership ceasing due to expiry on 31st March, a person will also cease to be a member when the person resigns, is suspended or expelled, or dies. A Group membership will also cease if the group is wound up.

Register of members

The Guild is required to comply with section 53 of the *Associations Incorporation Act 2015* to maintain a register of members. The official register must include each member's name, an address (whichever of residential, postal OR email address the member nominates), their membership date and type.

The Act gives members the right to inspect the register; however, they are bound not to use the information improperly. A member who wishes inspect the register must contact the membership convenor to make the necessary arrangements.

If a member requests a copy or extract of the register of members, the Committee may require the member to provide the request in writing with a statutory declaration setting out the purpose for which the information is required and declaring that the purpose is directly connected with the affairs of the Association.
