Sharing Table Saturday 12 September

On the table this Saturday, the sharings were few in number, but nevertheless some beautiful examples of our craft.

Margaret Jordan brought two shawls both handspun and knitted. One was merino and tencel in a Wedding Ring pattern where she blended coloured fibre with white to reduce the colour intensity. The other shawl of merino and silk was a pattern by Janina Kallio (? Not sure of the spelling so anyone taken with the pattern, check with Margaret!) (see front cover for photo).





The other Margaret bringing work this month was Marg PC with very playful sibling socks. She explains "Not enough of either colourway for a full pair so I took the plunge and knitted one of each and related them by knitting one round of the alternate colour at the toe."

My contribution was the result of a stay in Balingup and a foray into the new yarn shop there (thanks for the tip, Rachel!). I bought 3 balls of this enticing Italian Merino yarn and wove it into a scarf on my rigid heddle. The shop is definitely worth a visit if you are travelling that way and Alison, the proprietor is a spinner, weaver, felter.



The star of the show (sorry, Marg and Margaret) was the prayer shawl woven by **Gail Campbell**. This "Peace of My Heart" comes from Irene Schmoller who wrote:

"When the COVID-19 lockdown first began, I was inspired to serve our weaving community by offering projects that would encourage weavers to focus on things that are not only beautiful but meaningful. This Peace of My Heart Prayer Shawl was designed specifically so that we could come together and weave something that touches our hearts and gives us a sense of meaning".

Gail wove her version, 18" x 71" plus5" fringe, in fine silk. The structure is shadow weave set and woven at 30 ends per inch. It is perfectly beautiful, Gail, and absolutely inspiring!

Guild Annual Showcase

Start knitting, spinning, dyeing, felting and creating for the Guild Annual Showcase on **Saturday 13 February 2021**. There will be no theme this year, so let your imagination run free!

CATEGORIES, PRIZES and TROPHIES

General Notes:

- Two items can be submitted per member per category.
- Items cannot be entered in multiple categories.
- The item must have been completed by the entrant within 12 months of the entry date.
- Entrants are encouraged to attach an artist's statement to their entries, using the year's theme as inspiration if possible.
- Entries can be marked as not for judging if desired.
- Items must be submitted and prepared for Judging between 10:00 and 10:30am on the competition day.

WEAVING: THREE COMPETITION CATEGORIES

- Off loom weaving
- 2 Shaft, Rigid Heddle, or inkle loom weaving
- Multishaft manual loom weaving (excl computerised, mechanical, dobbytype looms)

Each of the above sections receives a certificate, and prize money or voucher. Judge to decide the best overall entry. The member submitting that entry then receives the **LYN WARING TROPHY**

SPINNING: TWO COMPETITION CATEGORIES

- 5 ply and under (14wpi or more)- minimum skein 25gr
- over 5 ply (less than 14wpi)- minimum skein 50gr

A skein made from handspun fibre, with attached sample and description of fibre and intended use. Each of the above sections is to receive a certificate, and prize money or voucher. Judge to decide the best overall entry. The member submitting that entry then receives the **CECILE DORWARD TROPHY**

FELTING:

Judge to select the best entry, which receives a certificate, prize money or voucher, and the **BARBARA FREW TROPHY**

DYEING:

Natural or chemical dyes permitted. The entry may be a skein or item of commercial or handspun fibre and will be judged on the quality of dyeing only. Judge to select the best entry, which receives a certificate and prize money or voucher and **ANNE BANCROFT TROPHY**

KNITTING/CROCHET:

Any handstitched item made from Handspun yarn, spun by the entrant. Judges to select the best entry, which receives a certificate, and prize money or voucher.

MIXED MEDIA:

An item made using predominantly any, or a mixture, of the core crafts of weaving, spinning, dyeing or felting, which can include any material, including (but not restricted to) recycled or up-cycled materials. The item can be in any form from garment, decorative, domestic, to sculptural. To be judged by all Judges together. Best entry receives certificate, and prize money or voucher.

NOVICE/JUNIOR:

Any item as per above categories, made by a first-time entrant or member under 18 years of age. Judges are to select the best Novice entry together, which receives a certificate and prize money or voucher and **JOSEPH DENNIS TROPHY**

GROUP or COLLABORATIVE ENTRY:

A group entry is to be a single item or cohesive set of items showcasing any mixture of the Guild's core crafts of weaving, spinning, dyeing or felting, where a group is defined as three or more individuals (who do not need to be an official Guild group). Items may also be partly crocheted or knitted. Note: items entered as a group entry CANNOT be also entered individually. To be judged by all Judges together. Best entry receives certificate, prize money or voucher and **TURNER COTTAGE TROPHY** (donated by Frank and Isobel McKay).

PRESIDENTS AWARD:

An entry chosen by the President of the day receives a certificate, prize money or voucher and **JOY SKINNER TROPHY**

POPULAR VOTE:


Members are to cast a vote for their selection. Votes are to be counted and the winner announced. Winner receives certificate and prize money or voucher and **ANNE RAIN TROPHY**

From the library


Something a bit different this month from the library—it's Editor's Choice!

It includes a range of different knitting techniques and stitches, and some really interesting styles (which, with a bit of yarn/colour substitution, could be made contemporary and fabulous). The 2021 International Scarf Exchange

The 29th International Scarf Exchange is being hosted by a 'consortium' of groups resident in the Shoalhaven area on the south coast of NSW. They are Berry Spinners & Weavers Inc, Nowra Spinners & Weavers Inc and Wool Road Spinners & Weavers Inc, with help from Murramarang Spinners & Weavers Inc.

The aims of the Scarf Exchange are to preserve the skills of spinning, weaving, knitting, crochet and felting, expand the wool craft network and to challenge each crafter to produce their best original work. The theme chosen for 2021, which you may interpret in any way you wish, is very apt for our location:



Participation involves you selecting, and sending to us, **150grams of** washed and prepared fresh natural fibre which must be free from any contamination or strong odours. Please ensure that all fibre is very clean and already combed or carded. Also ensure it has not absorbed any odours including mothballs or similar as this may trigger asthma. Please contact the co-ordinator if you are unfortunate enough to receive fibre that does not meet these standards. It will be returned to the sender.

Your fibre will be crafted into a scarf, wrap, gloves/mittens or socks, by another randomly selected participant in the exchange. You will also be sent another participant's fibre that you need to craft into a scarf, wrap, gloves/mittens or socks, using a method of your choice, adding extra fibre, or colour as you wish but please take into account any preferences expressed by the sender of the fibre.

Registration is from 1 August 2020 until 30 November 2020.

How to participate:

- 1. An entry form needs to be printed and filled out. Please ensure you take a photo or photocopy for your records.
- 2. The entry fee is to be paid either by cheque in Australian Dollars (AUD) included with your entry form or by electronic funds transfer (eft) instructions on the entry form (ENTRY FEE to help cover postage of both exchange fibre and finished item to you: Australia AUD\$20 New Zealand AUD\$30, USA AUD\$40, rest of world AUD\$50).
- 3. Send your fibre in a resealable bag with a fibre sample in a small separate bag, and a printed copy of your entry form to the address below **before Monday 30 November 2020**:

- 4. You will receive an exchange package of fibre plus a crafter sheet by the end of January 2021 and will then have 4 months to spin, dye, knit, crochet, felt or weave it into a wonderful creation to showcase the best of your fibre art talents.
- Deadline delivery date for return of your finished item, your crafter sheet and any excess fibre to the Wool Road Spinners & Weavers Inc is Friday 29 May 2021.
- 6. A virtual exhibition of all finished items is planned. Details to follow.
- 7. Finished items will be returned to participants by the end of July 2021.

Got a spare \$666,000?

In August this year Double Diamond, a Texel lamb in Scotland, sold for a record breaking 367,000 pounds (around \$666,000 Australian dollars), making him the world's most expensive sheep. The previous record for a sheep sale was just over 230,000 pounds in 2009.

Double Diamond is just about the perfect Texel, and carries "an index in the top 1 per cent of the breed".

The heavily muscled Texel sheep breed originates from the island of Texel in the Netherlands. They are reported to have been along the North Sea coast of Holland for many centuries. Today they are prized for their fast growth rate, high meat yield, leanness, and placid temperament. Their wool has a fairly high micron count (32-40 microns) and is mainly used for fine carpet yarns, hosiery and knitwear.
